The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) uses each MPO's LOPP to aid in their decisions as to which projects should be added to their Work Program each year. The Lake~Sumter MPO approves its



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LOPP annually. The LOPP represents those projects that have not yet been programmed but are considered high priorities by the MPO.

B. Federal Discretionary Grant Funding Strategy

Lake-Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization (LSMPO) has launched a study to develop a comprehensive Federal Grant Funding Strategy to find additional funding sources for advancing local transportation projects. This strategy considers each project's strengths/weaknesses and determines their overall eligibility for Federal Discretionary Grants. If found to be eligible, the plan identifies which specific Federal grant programs are best aligned. If they are not found to be eligible, recommendations are provided for strengthening them when possible. This strategy will allow for LSMPO to provide guidance on which projects may be best considered the best candidates, when may be the best opportunity to apply for a grant, and how to avoid any conflicts with other transportation agencies.

Financial Report Lake-Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization For the period ended March 31, 2024 (unaudited)

Background

The Lake-Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) has been designated by the Governor of the State of Florida as the body responsible for the urban transportation planning process for the Lake-Sumter Urban area. Organized in accordance with Title 23 CFR Section 450.308(c) and Florida Statute 339.175(9), the MPO prepares an annual Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). This document identifies the planning priorities and activities to be carried out for the fiscal year and the revenue sources and anticipated expenditures related to each approved task of the work program. Annually the MPO Board adopts a budget that summarizes the revenues and expenditures identified in the UPWP.

The MPO has entered into an agreement with the Lake County Board of County Commissioners for certain support services. Under this agreement, Lake County (the County) serves as the custodian of the MPO's funds and advances the MPO operating cash through their pooled cash account until reimbursement of grant funds is received by the MPO. The County accounts for the transactions of the MPO in a separate fund within their general ledger and prepares various general ledger reports to assist the MPO with its cash management responsibilities. Financial data to prepare this report was obtained from the Finance Department of Lake County and accruals for anticipated revenue and expenditure items were identified with their assistance.

Financial Summary

The financial information contained in this report is as of March 31, 2024 (75% of fiscal year elapsed). Revenues were greater than expenditures due to timing differences of accruals. Since the County performs expenditure accruals only for June 30 and Sept 30 period ends, some payroll and consultant expenditures in this reporting period were not accrued; however, they were included in our reimbursement request to FDOT. We accrued for our reimbursement invoices so our revenues appear much greater than expenditures for the period. A summary of revenues and expenditures for each of the major funding sources is shown below:

Invoice Submittal Status


<u>PL-112 FHWA Consolidated Planning Grant</u> - PL invoicing is performed quarterly using the accrual basis. Since the accrual basis is being used, invoicing is prepared from 2-3 months after the quarter end date to allow time to receive all vendor invoices. As of the date of this report, allowable expenditures for January through March 2024 are being compiled for reimbursement.

FTA Section 5305(d) Planning Grant – One invoice was submitted for the period January 1 through March 31st activity in the amount of \$29,715 and was paid in May 2024. As of the date of this report, allowable expenditures for March through June 2024 are being compiled for reimbursement.

<u>CTD Planning Grants</u> – The Commission for Transportation Disadvantaged Planning Grants represents \$53,172 of the fiscal 2024 budget. As of March 31st, \$15,952 has been received in revenue for the first and second quarters of grant activities.

Cash Management

The MPO is allowed to utilize Lake County's pooled cash account (up to \$500,000) to cover expenditures until grant reimbursements are received. The graph below reflects the MPO's utilization of County pooled cash for the past twelve - month period.



The MPO cash balance fluctuates due to the timing of invoice submittal, the timing of the receipt of cash for the amounts invoiced as well as the continual incurrence of operating expenditures regardless of an influx of cash from invoice reimbursement. The cash balance as of March 31, 2024, was \$104,232.

The cash utilization as of June 01, 2024, the date of this report, is \$274,143. All invoices for January through March charged costs to FTA 5305 program were submitted and received. The remaining cash utilization relates to January 1st through June 1st expenditures that have not yet been submitted for reimbursement. Since our FHWA Consolidated grant and FTA 5305(d) billings are now performed quarterly using the accrual basis, the MPO may at times carry a cash utilization balance equal to over five months operating expenditures due to timing of consultant invoices and payroll data from the County.

RESOLUTION OF THE LAKE~SUMTER METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION; AUTHORIZING ITS CHAIR TO MAKE, EXECUTE AND DELIVER THE TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED TRUST FUND GRANT AGREEMENT FOR FY 2024/25 TO THE FLORIDA COMMISSION FOR THE TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED AND OTHER AGENCIES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Lake~Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is the duly designated and constituted body responsible for carrying out the urban transportation planning and programming process, including transportation disadvantaged planning as authorized by Section 427.0159, Florida Statutes and Rule 41-2, Florida Administrative Code, for the Lake-Sumter MPO Planning Area; and

WHEREAS, the Lake~Sumter MPO is the Designated Official Planning Agency for transportation disadvantaged planning for the Lake~Sumter MPO Planning Area that includes Lake County and Sumter County; and

WHEREAS, the Lake~Sumter MPO has the authority to execute a Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund Grant Agreement and to undertake a transportation disadvantaged service project authorized by Section 427.0159, Florida Statutes, and Rule 41-2, Florida Administrative Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Lake~Sumter MPO that the:

- 1. The recitals above are true, accurate and correct and are incorporated herein.
- 2. The Chair of the Lake~Sumter MPO is authorized to make, execute, and deliver the FY 2024/25 Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund Agreement with and to the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged ("grant agreement").
- 3. The Chair of the Lake~Sumter MPO is authorized to sign any and all agreements, amendment, or supplements which are required in connection with the grant agreement.
- 4. The Chair of the Lake~Sumter MPO is authorized to sign any and all assurances, reimbursement invoices, warranties, certificates and any other documents which may be required in connection with the grant agreement.
- 5. The Chair of the Lake~Sumter MPO is hereby authorized and directed to submit the FY 2024/25 Transportation Disadvantaged Trust Fund Agreement to the:
 - a. Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) through the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).
 - b. Federal Transit Administration (FTA) through FDOT;
 - c. Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged.
- 6. This resolution shall be effective immediately upon its adoption.

1. SAAS SERVICES AND SUPPORT

- Subject to the terms and conditions of this 1.1 Agreement, Company will use commercially reasonable efforts to provide Customer the services described in the SOW attached hereto and made part hereof (the "Services"). Client acknowledges and agrees that the nature of the Services may change from time to time in the ordinary course of Company's business as the Company platform and service evolves. With respect to any Software that is distributed or provided to Customer for use on Customer premises or devices, Company hereby grants Customer a non-exclusive, non-transferable, nonsublicensable license to use such Software during the Term (as defined below) only in connection with the Services.
- 2.2 Customer and Company will each comply with applicable federal, state and local laws, rules and regulations relating to such Party's performance of its obligations under this Agreement. In addition, neither Customer nor Company shall engage in any unfair, deceptive, or abusive acts or practices.
- 2.3 Customer represents, covenants, and warrants that Customer will use the Services only in compliance with Company's standard published policies then in effect (the "Policy") and all applicable laws and regulations. Customer hereby agrees to indemnify and hold harmless Company against any damages, losses, liabilities,

- settlements and expenses (including without limitation costs and attorneys' fees) in connection with any claim or action that arises from an alleged violation of the foregoing. Although Company has no obligation to monitor Customer's use of the Services, Company may do so and may prohibit any use of the Services it believes may be (or alleged to be) in violation of the foregoing.

Company reserves the right to change the Fees or applicable charges and to institute new charges and Fees at the end of the Initial Service Term or then current renewal term, upon thirty (30) days prior notice to Customer (which may be sent by email). If Customer believes that Company has billed Customer incorrectly, Customer must contact Company no later than 60 days after the closing date on the first billing statement in which the error or problem appeared, in order to receive an adjustment or credit. Inquiries should be directed to Company's customer support department.

LAKE COUNTY ADDENDUM

The terms set forth on this Lake County Addendum shall be incorporated into the SaaS Service Agreement between the parties as if fully set forth therein, and shall prevail over any conflicting terms in the Order Form and/or Terms and Conditions regarding the subject matter addressed below.

1. **Insurance.**

- A. COMPANY will purchase and maintain at all times during the term of this Contract, without cost or expense to the COUNTY, policies of insurance as indicated below, with a company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Florida, and which are acceptable to the COUNTY, insuring the COMPANY against any and all claims, demands, or causes of action, for injuries received or damage to property relating to the performance of duties, services, or obligations of the COMPANY under the terms and provisions of the Contract. An original certificate of insurance, indicating that COMPANY has coverage in accordance with the requirements of this section must be received and accepted by the COUNTY prior to contract execution or before any work begins. It will be furnished by COMPANY to the COUNTY'S Project Manager and Procurement Services Director within five working days of such request. The parties agree that the policies of insurance and confirming certificates of insurance will insure the COMPANY in accordance with the following minimum limits:
- i. General Liability insurance on forms no more restrictive than the latest edition of the Occurrence Form Commercial General Liability policy (CG 00 01) of the Insurance Services Office or equivalent without restrictive endorsements, with the following minimum limits and coverage:

- iii. Workers' compensation insurance based on proper reporting of classification codes and payroll amounts in accordance with Chapter 440, Florida Statutes, and any other applicable law requiring workers' compensation (Federal, maritime, etc.).
 - iv. Employers Liability with the following minimum limits and coverage:

 - vi. Cyber Liability with a minimum limit of Confidential and Exempt per Section 119.0725(2), F.S.

- B. Lake County, a Political Subdivision of the State of Florida, and the Board of County Commissioners, will be named as additional insured as their interest may appear all applicable policies. Certificates of insurance must identify the RFP or ITB number in the Description of Operations section on the Certificate.
- C. COMPANY must provide a minimum of 30 days prior written notice to the County of any change, cancellation, or nonrenewal of the required insurance.
- D. Certificates of insurance must evidence a waiver of subrogation in favor of the COUNTY, that coverage must be primary and noncontributory, and that each evidenced policy includes a Cross Liability or Severability of Interests provision, with no requirement of premium by the COUNTY.
- E. COMPANY must provide a copy of all policy endorsements, reflecting the required coverage, with Lake County listed as an additional insured along with all required provisions to include waiver of subrogation. Contracts cannot be completed without this required insurance documentation. A certificate of insurance (COI) will not be accepted in lieu of the policy endorsements.
 - F. Certificate holder must be:

- G. All self-insured retentions will appear on the certificates and will be subject to approval by the COUNTY. At the option of the COUNTY, the insurer will reduce or eliminate such self-insured retentions; or COMPANY will be required to procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related claims expenses.
- H. The COUNTY will be exempt from, and in no way liable for, any sums of money, which may represent a deductible or self-insured retention in any insurance policy. The payment of such deductible or self-insured retention will be the sole responsibility of the COMPANY or subcontractor providing such insurance.
- I. COMPANY will be responsible for subcontractors and their insurance. Subcontractors are to provide Certificates of Insurance to the COUNTY evidencing coverage and terms in accordance with the COMPANY'S requirements.
- J. Failure to obtain and maintain such insurance as set out above will be considered a breach of contract and may result in termination of the contract for default.
- K. Neither approval by the COUNTY of any insurance supplied by COMPANY, nor a failure to disapprove that insurance, will relieve COMPANY of full responsibility of liability, damages, and accidents as set forth herein.
- 2. <u>Confidential Information.</u> During the term of this Agreement, Company may claim that some of Company's information, including, but not limited to, software documentation, manuals, written methodologies and processes, pricing, discounts, or other considerations (collectively referred to as Confidential Information), is, or has been treated as confidential and proprietary in accordance with Florida Statutes 812.081, or other law, and is exempt from disclosure under Florida's public record laws. Company shall clearly identify and mark Confidential Information as "Confidential Information" or and the Customer shall use reasonable efforts to maintain the confidentiality of the Confidential Information that is clearly

identified by Company and is confidential pursuant to Florida Statutes. Company may assert any exemption from disclosure available under Florida law.

- 3. <u>Indemnification/Sovereign Immunity</u>. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed as waiving Lake County's sovereign immunity protections provided under applicable law. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, no indemnification obligation or liability of County under this Agreement shall exceed the amount paid for services pursuant to this Agreement.
- 4. <u>Public Records.</u> Pursuant to Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes, Company shall comply with the Florida Public Records' laws, and shall:
 - a. Keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the services identified herein.
 - b. Upon request from the County's custodian of public records, provide the County with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided for by law.
 - c. Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the contract if Company does not transfer the records to the County.
 - d. Upon completion of the agreement, transfer, at no cost, to the County all public records in possession of Company or keep and maintain public records required by the County to perform the service. If Company transfers all public records to the County upon completion of the contract, Company shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt, or confidential and exempt, from public records disclosure requirements. If Company keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the contract, Company shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the County, upon request from the County's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the County.
 - e. IF COMPANY HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO COMPANY'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, CONTACT THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT LAKE COUNTY'S OFFICE OF PROCUREMENT SERVICES, 315 WEST MAIN STREET, P.O. BOX 7800, TAVARES, LAKE COUNTY, FL, OR AT 352-343-9424 OR VIA EMAIL AT PURCHASING@LAKECOUNTYFL.GOV.
 - f. Failure to comply with this subsection will be deemed a breach of the agreement and enforceable as set forth in Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes.
 - g. Unless otherwise provided, Company shall maintain substantiating records as required by the State of Florida, General Records Schedule GS1-SL ("Schedule") for State and Local Government Agencies. If Developer receives notification of a dispute or the commencement of litigation regarding the Agreement within the time specified in the

Schedule, the Developer shall continue to maintain all service records until final resolution of the dispute or litigation.

- 3. <u>Data Security.</u> With respect to the System and environment the Company uses to provide services, including those for data storage and transmission, the Company agrees as follows:
 - a. Ownership of County Data. Lake County is the owner of its data, data compilations and reports or compilations of its data generated from use of the Licensed System ("County Data"). Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in the contract, the County will have the right to use the Company's Licensed System to access and have unfettered use of such data, reports, compilations, or information derived from or resulting from the use of the Licensed System or to generate reports from such data, files, or information. Company acknowledges and agrees that the County is the owner and custodian of the data, compilations, and information, whether or not such is electronically retained and regardless of the retention media and that the use of the Licensed System in relation to such information or data does not in any way restrict County in the County's rights of disclosure of its data and information.
 - b. <u>County Proprietary Information</u>. The Company shall take necessary security measures to ensure that the County proprietary information cannot be downloaded to or printed from any devices that its employees, contractors or subcontractors use, including, and without limitation, desktops, laptops, and USB flash drives.
 - c. <u>County Data</u>. In storing or processing the County Data, the Company shall not comingle the County Data with any data from Company's other clients.
 - d. Security Operating Protocols. The Company shall employ generally accepted industry security methods and internal security operating protocols to prevent intrusion into the service the Company provides to the County or interception of data or communications by unauthorized third parties. Such practices must include, without limitation: encryption of data for storage and for transmission; firewall protection; password protection; review of firewall logs and intrusion detection notifications on a daily basis; and update of virus definitions and security patches on an as-needed basis. The Company shall provide independent verification of systems and security controls on an annual basis. The Company shall provide the most recent SOC 2 Type 2 report for review to the County prior to contract execution. County may request to review the SOC 2 Type 2 report on a yearly basis.
 - e. <u>Hosting Provider</u>. The Company shall only use servers located in secure facilities in the U.S. and administered by a third-party hosting provider ("Hosting Provider") to provide services to the County. The Company represents and warrants that each Hosting Provider used by the Company will cause to be conducted, on at least an annual basis, an SSAE 16 Type II (or equivalent) security audit by a reputable security specialist who must identify in a written report (a copy of which must be promptly delivered to the County upon request and which must be the Company's Proprietary Information) any readily identifiable security vulnerabilities in connection with the applicable Hosting Provider's services that the Company uses and the operating environment.
 - f. <u>County Data Location</u>. Except for sending the County Data to the County, the Company shall keep the County Data solely in its Hosting Provider's facility or facilities located in the United States and shall not allow such data to leave such facility or facilities in any form.
 - g. <u>Confidentiality of Data</u>. All County and County employee data encountered in the course of this project and in administration of the plan is strictly confidential. All Administrator staff, including

any subcontractors, who may have access to or potential access to any confidential County data must protect this data from unauthorized access. Under no circumstances may County employee data be disclosed to parties outside the contract or used for purposes other than the fulfillment of the contract.

- h. <u>Backup Materials</u>. Licensor shall maintain backup servers as well as a complete and current backup copy of the System that the Licensor uses to provide services to the Licensee and the data processed through the System ("Backup Materials"). Backup Materials must be maintained at a separate physical location in the United States. If access or use of the service is interrupted, the appropriate backup must be activated within four (4) hours to minimize disruptions.
- i. <u>Security Breach Notification.</u> Company shall have policies and procedures in place for the effective management of Security Breaches, as defined below. In the event of any actual, attempted, suspected, threatened, or reasonably foreseeable circumstance Company experiences or learns of that either compromises or could reasonably be expected to comprise County data through unauthorized use, disclosure, or acquisition of County data ("Security Breach"), Company shall immediately notify County of its discovery. After such notification, Company shall, at its own expense, immediately:
 - Investigate to determine the nature and extent of the Security Breach.
 - Contain the incident by taking necessary action, including, but not limited to, attempting to recover records, revoking access, and/or correcting weaknesses in security.
 - Report to County the nature of the Security Breach, the County data used or disclosed, the
 person who made the unauthorized use or received the unauthorized disclosure, what
 Company has done or will do to mitigate any harmful effect of the unauthorized use or
 disclosure, and the corrective action Company has taken or will take to prevent future
 similar unauthorized use or disclosure.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE LAKE~SUMTER METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION AND EAST CENTRAL FLORIDA REGIONAL PLANNING COUNCIL FOR GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM AND TRANSPORTATION PLANNING SERVICES

This is an Interlocal Agreement between the Lake~Sumter Metropolitan Planning Organization, a metropolitan planning organization created under Section 339.175, Florida Statutes (the "MPO") and the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, an area-wide association of governments ("CONSULTANT").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the MPO is seeking an entity to provide geographic information system and transportation management system services for the MPO, on an as-needed basis; and

WHEREAS, the CONSULTANT desires to perform such services subject to the terms of this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, IN CONSIDERATION of the mutual terms, understandings, conditions, promises, covenants, and payment hereinafter set forth, and intending to be legally bound, the parties hereby agree as follows:

Article 1. Recitals

1.1 The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein.

Article 2. Scope of Services

- 2.1 On the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, the MPO hereby engages CONSULTANT to provide geographic information system and transportation management system services as specified in the Scope of Services, attached hereto and incorporated herein as **Exhibit A**. The Scope of Services may be modified by an amendment to this Agreement, but to be effective and binding such amendment must be in writing and signed by CONSULTANT's authorized representative and the MPO Chairman or MPO Executive Director. CONSULTANT acknowledges and agrees that if work is assigned to CONSULTANT, each individual project shall have a specific scope agreed to by the parties by way of a task work order.
- 2.2 This Agreement shall be effective for the sixty (60) month period immediately following the date of execution of the Agreement by the MPO. The MPO reserves the sole right to renew this Agreement for two (2) additional one (1) year periods. CONSULTANT shall maintain, for the entirety of the stated additional period(s), if any, the same prices, terms, and conditions included within this Agreement.
- 2.3 CONSULTANT agrees that this Agreement will be an open quantity contract. The MPO does not guarantee to CONSULTANT any minimum amount of work throughout the term of this Agreement. Furthermore, CONSULTANT agrees and acknowledges that in the event CONSULTANT cannot meet the MPO's specifications, including but not limited to time for completion or cost for individual project, that the MPO reserves the sole right to offer the individual project to the MPO's other consultant(s).
- 2.4 Any work that commences prior to and will extend beyond the expiration date of the current Agreement period shall, unless terminated by mutual written agreement between the MPO and CONSULTANT, continue until completion at the same prices, terms, and conditions.

2.5 CONSULTANT shall utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system in accordance with the terms governing use of the system to confirm the employment eligibility of all new persons hired by CONSULTANT during the term of this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall include in all contracts with subcontractors performing work pursuant to any contract arising from this Agreement an express requirement that the subcontractors utilize the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's &Verify system in accordance with the terms governing use of the system to confirm the employment eligibility of all new employees hired by the subcontractors during the term of the contract.

Article 3. Payment

- 3.1 Payment shall be based upon a negotiated lump sum fee, arrived at utilizing the hourly rates set forth in Consultant's Pricing, attached hereto and incorporated herein as **Exhibit B**. The personnel needed for each individual project shall be determined through the Task Work Order. Upon reviewing the project specific scope, the CONSULTANT shall submit a list of specific tasks to be performed as part of the project, including any alternate tasks, and a detailed estimated cost sheet. A list of deliverables shall also be provided. The lump sum fee will be the approved total hours and related direct expenses.
- 3.2 CONSULTANT shall submit monthly invoices to the MPO. These invoices must be submitted monthly to the MPO at 1300 Citizens Blvd., Leesburg, FL 34748. The invoices must reflect the type of service provided to the MPO. CONSULTANT may be assigned work by task work order and each task work order will be assigned a single identification number for billing purposes. CONSULTANT agrees to provide MPO each month with invoices identifying in detail the cost incurred for services performed and a detailed progress report for each specific task.
- 3.3 The MPO will make payment on all invoices in accordance with the Florida Prompt Payment Act, Chapter 218, Part VII, Florida Statutes. Failure to submit invoices in the prescribed manner will delay payment, and CONSULTANT may be considered in default and this Agreement may be terminated.
- 3.4 Other than the fees and rates set forth in **Exhibit B**, CONSULTANT shall not be entitled to payment for any expenses, fees, or other costs. it may incur at any time and in any connection with its performance hereunder.
- 3.5 In the event any part of this Agreement is to be funded by federal, state, or other local agency. monies, CONSULTANT agrees to comply with all requirements of the funding entity applicable to the use of the monies, including full application of requirements involving the use of minority firms, women's business enterprises, and labor surplus area firms. CONSULTANT is advised that payments under this Agreement may be withheld pending completion and submission of all required forms and documents required of CONSULTANT pursuant to the grant funding requirements. A copy of the requirements will be supplied to CONSULTANT by the MPO upon request.

Article 4. MPO Responsibilities

4.1 MPO will promptly review the deliverables and other materials submitted by CONSULTANT and provide direction to CONSULTANT as needed. MPO will provide to CONSULTANT all necessary and available data, photos, and documents the MPO possesses that would be useful to CONSULTANT in the completion of the required services. MPO shall designate one MPO staff member to act as MPO'S Project Manager.

4.2 MPO shall reimburse CONSULTANT, in accordance with the provisions of Article 3 above for required services timely submitted and approved and accepted by MPO in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

Article 5. Special Terms and Conditions

- 5.1 <u>Termination.</u> This Agreement may be terminated by the MPO upon thirty (30) days advance written notice to the other party; but if any service under this Agreement is in progress but not completed as of the date of termination, then this Agreement may be extended upon written approval of the MPO until said service is completed and accepted.
- A. Termination for Convenience. In the event this Agreement is terminated or cancelled upon the request and for the convenience of the MPO with the required thirty (30) day advance written notice, MPO shall reimburse CONSULTANT for actual work satisfactorily completed and reasonable expenses incurred.
- B. Termination for Cause. Termination by the MPO for cause, default, or negligence on the part of CONSULTANT shall be excluded from the foregoing provision. Termination costs, if any, shall not apply. The 30-day advance notice requirement is waived in the event of termination for cause.
- C. Termination Due to Unavailability of Funds in Succeeding Fiscal Years. When funds are not appropriated or otherwise made available to support continuation of performance in a subsequent fiscal year, this Agreement shall be canceled, and CONSULTANT shall be reimbursed for services satisfactorily performed and the reasonable value of any non-recurring costs incurred but not amortized in the price of the services delivered under this Agreement.
- 5.2 <u>Assignment of Agreement.</u> This Agreement shall not be assigned or sublet except with the written consent of the MPO.
- 5.3 <u>Conflict of Interest.</u> CONSULTANT agrees that it will not engage in any action that would create a conflict of interest in the performance of its obligations pursuant to this Agreement, or which would violate or cause others to violate the provisions of Part III, Chapter 112, Florida Statutes, relating to ethics in government. Further, CONSULTANT certifies that no officer, agent, or employee of the MPO has any material interest either directly or indirectly in the business of CONSULTANT and that no such person may have any such interest at any time during the term of this Agreement unless approved by the MPO.
- 5.4 <u>Independent Contractor.</u> CONSULTANT, and all its employees, agree that they will be acting as independent contractors and will not be considered or deemed to be an agent, employee, joint ventures, or partner of the MPO.
- Ownership of Deliverables. Upon completion of and payment for a task CONSULTANT agrees all tasks and/or deliverables under this Agreement, and other data generated or developed by CONSULTANT under this Agreement or furnished by MPO to CONSULTANT shall be and/or remain the property of the MPO. CONSULTANT shall perform any acts that may be deemed necessary or desirable by MPO to transfer ownership of all Tasks more fully and/or deliverables to MPO, at MPO's expense. Additionally, CONSULTANT hereby represents that it has full right and authority to perform its obligations specified in this Agreement. CONSULTANT and MPO recognize that CONSULTANT's work product submitted in performance of this Agreement is intended only for the project described in this Agreement. MPO's alteration of CONSULTANT's work product or its use by MPO for any other purpose shall be at MPO's sole risk.

- 5.6 <u>Return of Materials.</u> Upon the request of the MPO, but in any event upon termination of this Agreement, CONSULTANT shall surrender to the MPO all memoranda, notes, records, drawings, manuals, computer software, and other documents or materials pertaining to the services hereunder, that were furnished to the CONSULTANT by the MPO pursuant to this Agreement. CONSULTANT may keep copies of all work product for its records.
- 5.7 <u>Retaining Other Consultants.</u> Nothing herein shall be deemed to preclude the MPO from retaining the services of other persons or entities undertaking the same or similar services as those undertaken by CONSULTANT or from independently developing or acquiring materials or programs that are similar to, or competitive with, the services provided under this Agreement.
- 5.8 <u>Accuracy and Standard of Care.</u> CONSULTANT is responsible for the professional quality, technical accuracy, timely completion, and coordination of all the services furnished hereunder, CONSULTANT shall, without additional compensation, correct or revise any errors, omissions or other deficiencies in its designs, drawings, reports, or other services due to causes within its reasonable control. Any corrections shall be made within thirty (30) calendar days after such deficiencies or non-conformances are reported by the MPO.
- 5.9 Truth in Negotiation Certificate. For all lump-sum or cost-plus fixed fee agreements exceeding \$150,000.00, the firm awarded the agreement must execute a truth in negotiation certificate stating that the wage rates and other factual unit costs are accurate, complete, and current, at the time of contracting. Any agreement requiring this certificate shall contain a provision that the original agreement price and any additions shall be adjusted to exclude any significant sums by which the MPO determines the agreement price was increased due to inaccurate, incomplete, or non-cent wage rates and other factual unit costs. All such agreement adjustments shall be made within one (1) year following the end of the contract. Execution of this Agreement constitutes execution of the Truth in Negotiation Certificate.
- 5.10 Prohibition Against Contingent Fees. CONSULTANT warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for CONSULTANT to solicit or secure this Agreement and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual, or firm other than a bona fide employee working solely for CONSULTANT any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or other consideration contingent upon on resulting from the award or making of this Agreement.
- 5.11 <u>Public Records.</u> Pursuant to Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes, CONSULTANT shall comply with the Florida Public Records' laws, and shall:
- A. Keep and maintain public records required by the MPO to perform the services identified in this Agreement.
- B. Upon request from the MPO's custodian of public records, provide the MPO with a copy of the requested records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided for by law.
- C. Ensure that public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following completion of the contract if CONSULTANT does not transfer the records to the MPO.
- D. Upon completion of the contract, transfer at no cost, to the MPO all public records in possession of CONSULTANT or keep and. maintain public records required by the MPO to perform the

service. If CONSULTANT transfers all public records to the MPO upon completion of the contract, CONSULTANT shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt, or confidential and exempt, from public records disclosure requirements. If CONSULTANT keeps and maintains public records upon completion of the contract, CONSULTANT shall meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records. All records stored electronically must be provided to the MPO, upon request from the MPO's custodian of public records, in a format that is compatible with the information technology systems of the MPO.

- E. IF THE CONSULTANT HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, FLORIDA STATUTES, TO THE CONSULTANT'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS CONTRACT, CONTACT. THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS, MICHAEL WOODS, AT LAKE-SUMTER MPO, 352-315-0170, OR VIA EMAIL AT MICHAEL.WOODS@LAKESUMTERMPO.COM.
- F. Failure to comply with this subsection will be deemed a breach of the Agreement and enforceable as set forth in Section 119.0701, Florida Statutes.
- G. Unless otherwise provided, CONSULTANT shall maintain substantiating records as required by the State of Florida, General Records Schedule GS1-SL ("Schedule") for State and Local Government Agencies. If CONSULTANT receives notification of a dispute or the commencement of litigation regarding the Agreement within the time specified in the Schedule, the CONSULTANT shall continue to maintain all service records until final resolution of the dispute or litigation.

Article 6. Miscellaneous Provisions

- 6.1 This Agreement is made under, and in all respects shall be interpreted, construed, and governed by and in accordance with, the laws of the State of Florida. Venue for any legal action resulting from this Agreement shall lie in Lake County, Florida. CONSULTANT waives its right to a jury trial for any action arising from this Agreement.
- 6.2 The captions utilized in this Agreement are for the purposes of identification only and do not control or affect the meaning or construction of any of the provisions hereof.
- 6.3 This Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of each of the parties and of their respective successors and permitted assigns.
- 6.4 This Agreement may not be amended, released, discharged, rescinded, or abandoned, except by a written instrument duly executed by each of the parties hereto, unless otherwise stated herein.
- 6.5 The failure of any party hereto at any time to enforce any of the provisions of this Agreement will in no way constitute or be construed as a waiver of such provision or of any other provision hereof, nor in any way affect the validity of, or the right thereafter to enforce, each and every provision of this Agreement.
- During the term of this Agreement CONSULTANT assures MPO that it is in compliance with Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act, as amended, and the Florida Civil Rights Act of 1992, in that CONSULTANT does not on the grounds of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, age, disability or marital status, discrimination in any form or manner against CONSULTANT employees or applicants for







<u>PROJECT</u>: NORTHERN TURNPIKE MAINLINE/SR 91 WIDENING PROJECT FROM SR 50/CLERMONT TO HANCOCK ROAD/MINNEOLA (MILEPOSTS 273 TO 279)

<u>DETAILS</u>: Florida's Turnpike Enterprise is widening Florida's Turnpike/State Road (SR) 91 from four to eight lanes from Clermont/SR 50 to Minneola/Hancock Road, in Lake and Orange counties.

DESCRIPTION: This project includes constructing a new Fosgate Road bridge over the Turnpike. The bridges at County Road (CR) 438 and CR 455 will also be replaced, as well as the Turnpike bridges over Jones Road, Old Highway 50, and Blackstill Lake Road. The West Orange Trail bridge over the Turnpike will be replaced with a prefabricated structure. New electronic tolling gantries and buildings will be installed, and the existing toll booths and canopies at the SR 50/Clermont entrance and exit ramps will be demolished. Safety improvements for this project include a new Intelligent Transportation System (ITS), new signage, new pavement markings, new signalization, new lighting, and new drainage systems.

The construction cost of the project is estimated at \$162.3M. The project is anticipated to be completed in mid-2026.

<u>CURRENT ACTIVITIES</u>: Current project activities include ongoing median construction involving drainage installation, subgrade preparation, asphalt placement, existing box culverts rehabilitation/reconstruction, and bridge demolition, continuing through mid-2024. Fosgate Road bridge construction is also underway, slated for completion by mid-2026.

Additionally, work within the project area encompasses pond construction, both temporary and permanent lighting installation, box culvert extensions, embankment, subgrade and base placement, temporary asphalt, fencing, temporary and permanent retaining wall construction, as well as temporary and

permanent drainage systems. Pile driving activities resumed for the new southbound bridges at Blackstill Lake Road, Old Highway 50, and Jones Road.

The toll building at the northbound exit ramp to SR 50 (milepost 272) is set for completion by the end of the year, while the toll building foundation at the southbound entrance ramp from SR 50 has commenced and is expected to be completed by early 2025.

<u>DETAILS</u>: Florida's Turnpike Enterprise is widening Florida's Turnpike/SR 91 from four to eight lanes from Minneola/Hancock Road to O'Brien Road, in Lake County.

<u>DESCRIPTION</u>: This project will widen Florida's Turnpike from two to four lanes in each direction, for a total of eight lanes within the project limits. It also includes reconstruction of all bridges within the project limits, interchange improvements at US 27 South, and installation of new continuous LED lighting from the Minneola interchange to the US 27 South interchange and under Turnpike bridges over CR 561 and SR 19. This project also includes the installation of taller guardrails, highly reflective signage, Closed Circuit Television devices, ITS, and pavement markings.

The construction cost of the project is estimated at \$233M. The project is anticipated to be completed in mid-2028.

<u>CURRENT ACTIVITIES</u>: The contractor has made significant progress in various aspects of the project. Clearing and grubbing operations are mostly complete, with sub-soil excavation finished in the northbound lanes. The remaining excavation will commence after traffic has transitioned to the new northbound lanes. Earthwork is ongoing, shaping material for slopes along the roadway and in ponds. Lime rock base and structural asphalt are being laid on the northbound outside lanes, with a new northbound roadway section already opened.

Temporary pavement is being installed at the southbound exit ramp to Exit 279 in preparation for asphalt resurfacing. Stormwater drainage system construction is underway, including the installation of box culverts and MSE wall construction at specified locations. Additionally, progress includes the installation of temporary ITS and conduits for fiber optic lines.

Phase 1 of the US 27 bridge is now accessible via the new northbound exit ramp to Exit 285, while demolition of the existing US 27 bridge has begun.

<u>DETAILS</u>: Florida's Turnpike Enterprise improved traffic operations at the interchange of Florida's Turnpike/SR 91 and Claude Pepper Memorial Highway/US 27 at milepost 289 in Lake County. A new left turn lane was added at the exit from Florida's Turnpike to Claude Pepper Memorial Highway. Additional improvements included installing mast arm signals, new drainage structures, and wrong way driving counter measures.

Construction was completed on May 17, 2024.






LAKE COUNTY CONNECTION RIDERSHIP COMPARISON

Transportation Projects

• Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan (TDSP)

Florida's Transportation Disadvantaged (TD) program was created in 1979 and re-enacted in 1989. The 1989 act created the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (CTD) to enhance local participation in planning and delivery of coordinated transportation services through the creation of Local Coordinating Boards (LCBs) and Community Transportation Coordinators (CTCs). In November 2000, the Board of County Commissioners became the Community Transportation Coordinator for Lake County, Florida.

The TDSP is a 5-year plan that guides the Community Transportation Coordinator as to how transportation services will be provided in Lake County. Each year the TDSP is updated to ensure the plan meets all local, state, and federal regulations.

The plan is expected to be approved by the Lake County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board and the Lake County Board of County Commissioners in June 10, 2024.

CTC Evaluation

As the planning agency for Lake County, the Lake~Sumter MPO is required to annually conduct an evaluation on the Community Transportation Coordinator. The evaluation began in January 2024 and will be completed by June 2024. The Lake~Sumter MPO reviews several aspects of the paratransit door-to-door services such as the day to day operations, eligibility applications, complaints, operator monitoring reports, operator contracts, driver training records, drug and alcohol policy, coordination contractors, operator manual, vehicle inspection, ride a vehicle during service hours, conduct survey's, review system safety program plan, etc.


ADA Accessible Bus Stop Pads

In Fiscal Year 2023, 33 ADA-accessible LakeXpress bus stop pads were installed throughout the system. In Fiscal Year 2024, 29 accessible bus stop pads have been built with additional pads to be built based on grant funding availability.

Bus Stop Inventory

In August 2023, a systemwide bus stop inventory was completed. The inventory reviewed all 496 LakeXpress bus stops, recording access; ADA accessibility; amenities such as benches, shelters, trash cans, and lighting; and any necessary repairs.



Figure 1: Trips by Trip Purpose



Figure 2: Total Passenger Miles



Figure 3: Total Passenger Trips



Figure 4: On-Time Performance



Figure 5: Sumter County Transit Fund



Figure 6: Sumter County Transit Revenue



Project Description

The historic Moving Florida Forward Infrastructure Initiative (fdot.gov/movingfloridaforward) is allowing the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to advance much-needed improvements to Interstate 75 (I-75) in Central Florida, with construction anticipated to begin in spring 2025.

FDOT is conducting a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study for the I-75 improvements from south of State Road (S.R.) 44 to S.R. 200 in Marion and Sumter Counties, a distance of approximately 23 miles. The purpose of this project is to reduce congestion and improve reliability on I-75 while minimizing potential impacts to natural, social, cultural, and physical environments. The design phase is being conducted concurrently with the PD&E Study.

Alternatives Evaluated

The PD&E Study is evaluating two alternatives:


- No Build Alternative Assumes no improvements would be made to I-75.
- Build Alternative Includes the addition of an auxiliary lane in each direction between interchanges. The operational and safety benefits of the build alternative were also evaluated.

The alternatives and the analysis results are being shared with the community through an extensive public engagement program, which includes individual stakeholder meetings, community meetings, a public informational meeting, and a public hearing.

Based on the evaluation and feedback from the community, FDOT is recommending the build alternative as the preferred alternative, which is shown on page 1.

Progress is also continuing on the I-75 Improvements from S.R. 200 to S.R. 326. The PD&E study was approved in May 2024, and design is underway.
